






Snow Day P2 Home Learning 19th of January 2024

<p><u>Writing</u> Draw a detailed picture of yourself and write an outdoor learning journal about what you have been doing in the snowy weather.</p> <p>Or</p> <p>Practise correct letter formation by writing out your sounds in lower case and capital letters with an adult to check. Use the sound mats to make sure you don't miss any.</p>	<p><u>Number Bonds to 5/ 10/ 20</u> Using the part part whole/cherry sum format below, write down (on paper or a whiteboard) all number bonds to make 5 <u>or</u> all number bonds to make 10 <u>or</u> all number bonds to make 20 For example:</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around; align-items: center;"> <div style="text-align: center;">  </div> <div style="text-align: center;">  </div> <div style="text-align: center;">  </div> </div>	<p><u>Science</u> Make a baking soda volcano Fill a small glass jar with:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2 tbsp of baking/bicarbonate of soda • 1 tbsp of washing-up liquid • few drops of red food colouring <p>Pile up a heap of snow around the jar, making the top of the snow level with the top of the jar. Finally, add 30ml of vinegar and stand back to watch the snow volcano erupt!</p>
<p><u>Reading</u> Read your reading book with a family member. Then: Design and draw a new front cover for your reading book.</p> <p>Or</p> <p>Be a word detective and write a list of adjectives (describing words) you find in your reading book. I wonder how many there is...?</p>	<p><u>Addition and Subtraction</u> We have been talking about writing a sum both ways, for example $4+2=6$ and $2+4=6$. You still get the same answer as the numbers are the same. BUT- our top tip is to always start adding with the bigger number as you have less adding to do.</p> <p>Using counters/ beads/ pieces of pasta, whatever you have at home, play games where you add two collections together and your child has to write (on paper or a whiteboard) both sums for the two collections. For example:</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around; align-items: center;">   </div> <p>$3+5=8$ and $5+3=8$ And which sum is easier? $5+3=8$ because it starts with the bigger number.</p>	<p><u>Outdoor Learning</u> Wrap up warm and get outside in the snow for some fun!
